#### **GETTING STARTED**

- ▶ As this will be the last Life Group meeting before Thanksgiving, share one or two things you have been most thankful for this year.
- ▶ What's your favorite thing about the Thanksgiving Holiday?
- ▶ One of the consistent responses to Jesus' miraculous works was amazement (Mark 1:27, 2:12). When you think of the stories told of Jesus in the gospels, what amazes you?

### **DIGGING DEEPER**

1. In the message this weekend, we saw that Jesus is the one who's to come to make all things new. It's therefore not surprising that Peter reflects on this theme in 1 Peter 1:1-9. How does Jesus make all things new?

If we've been given a new birth, why does it seem like we're often the same old person?

What does it look like to possess a living hope?

If God's power is keeping us safe until the coming of our salvation (v.5), why does Peter immediately suggest that we may endure grief through suffering all kinds of trials (v.6)? How could this passage encourage or challenge you this week?

2. Read Romans 8:1-11. What stands out to you in this passage?

According to Paul, we are no longer condemned. What happened that changed our status?

What would you say to a Christian unsure if they were forgiven?

What do you think it means that the righteous requirements of the law are fully met in us, and how is this good news?

How would you describe the difference between the mind governed by the flesh and the mind governed by the Spirit to a new Christian?

How does this change demonstrate God's power?

### FOR PRACTICE

This weekend, we read the story in Mark 2 of four friends carrying a paralytic to Jesus. Undaunted by their inability to enter the house, they climbed to the roof, peeled back a section, and lowered their friend before the Lord. In addition to emphasizing Jesus' authority to forgive sins, the passage also speaks about the role of community. In our spiritual lives, sometimes we carry, and sometimes we're on the mat. Particularly with our fears. When receiving a negative diagnosis, experiencing the loss of a loved one, or so many other terrifying moments, we need friends who, amid our fears, will bring us to Jesus. As a community practice this week, consider sharing with your group members the things that stir your deepest fears and are most likely to take your eyes off Jesus.
