GETTING STARTED

- ▶ Have you ever been around someone who was consistently judgmental or legalistic? What was it like being around them, and how did they impact their family and friends?
- ▶ Over the past two weeks, we've read about conflicts Jesus has had with the religious authorities over Sabbath rules. In your life, do you tend to be a rule follower or rule breaker? Have you found this tendency to be a greater strength or weakness?

DIGGING DEEPER

1. Observing the Sabbath is the only one of the 10 Commandments not repeated in the New Testament. While the command isn't repeated, the concept of building regular times of rest and renewal into our busy lives is found throughout the Bible. Read Genesis 2:1-3, Mark 6:30-31 & Matthew 11:28-30. What stands out to you in these passages?

Why do you think God rested in Genesis chapter two?

Do you think it's important for Christians to prioritize the Sabbath?

What are the biggest challenges you face in creating enough margin in life to allow you to rest and renew?

If you were to create a weekly rhythm of renewal, what elements would you include in your day of rest?

2. In Mark chapter three, we read about the appointing of the twelve disciples. While God eventually used some of these disciples to make an incredible impact on the world, they were far from a spiritual All-Star team. Read 1 Corinthians 1:26-31. How did the twelve disciples fit Paul's description of foolish, low, and despised?

How did Paul himself fit this description?

How does it feel to you to be in this category?

Why does God choose these kinds of people for His kingdom work?

If God chooses and uses those who are foolish and weak, does that mean we shouldn't bother trying to grow, learn, or change?

For Practice

Biblically speaking, the Sabbath is a 24-hour time period set aside to stop, rest, delight, and worship. Those who practice it regularly will tell you it is the best day of the week. In our era of chronic exhaustion, emotional unhealth, and spiritual stagnation, few things are more necessary than the recovery of this practice. If you're not doing it yet, taking the full 24 hours to rest might be tricky to fit into your schedule. If that's you, consider a morning or an afternoon where you unplug, turn your phone, and rest. Say a prayer, read some scripture... and then take a nap, go for a run, read a good book, or call a friend. When your time is over, take another moment to thank God for the gift of rest.
